Club Business Report

WHEELMEN JOIN VOICE OF THE PARKWAY COALITION

At the April 13 club Zoom meeting, the Sacramento Wheelmen voted to throw the club's full weight behind an American River Parkway Foundation (ARPF) effort to rid the parkway of illegal campers.

In joining the Voice of the Parkway Coalition, the club endorsed a recent letter sent to Sacramento County and Sacramento City officials demanding that illegal homeless campers be removed from the parkway.

Pressure has been mounting on state and local politicians. On April 6, the Sacramento City Council voted to place the "Emergency Shelter and Enforcement Act of 2022" on the November ballot. The ordinance would outlaw homeless encampments once the city creates enough shelter spaces or Safe Ground camping sites. On April 8, a few state legislators introduced a bill proposal that would make it easier for local governments to clear out homeless encampments within "special parklands" like the American River Parkway. A 2018 federal appeals court ruling prohibits enforcement of anti-camping laws if enough shelter space is not

available. At this time, that ruling applies to the American River Parkway. The proposed bill is intended to exempt the parkway from meeting that shelter requirement. The bill was scheduled for a public hearing on April 26.

There are an estimated 160,000 homeless in California, of which an estimated 2,000 live along the American River Parkway.

After watching *Parkway in Peril*, a 13-minute video produced by the ARPF, the club voted unanimously to join the coalition. After the meeting, President Tom Adams informed the ARPF.

In other meeting business, the club voted to move out of our storage locker and heard about progress on a new club web site.

The club's storage locker costs \$2,200 per year. Tim Koch believes he can store everything he needs for the annual Oregon Tour and the annual club picnic in a storage shed on his property, and he has offered to do so. Should additional storage space be required, we have the option of renting a smaller locker than the one we currently rent and that would also result in cutting club annual expenses.

A great deal of space in our locker is currently being taken up by garbage cans and large coolers which haven't been in use since the last time the club put on the Sierra Century. It was argued that selling or giving away old Sierra Century supplies now will save the club money in the long run, compared to paying for storage, even if the club decides to start up the Sierra Century at some future date which would require repurchasing supplies.

Ron Davies and Tom Adams reported on their assessment of what features on our current web site should be retained and what elements should be dropped as we move toward a new web site format for the club. The idea is to retain all the important elements essential to promoting the club and informing club members, and dropping non-essential or outdated elements. The web site needs to be kept up to date, so we should not try to do more with it than we can support with updated information, they argued. A web site transfer checklist has been created, along with a list of items which will not be transferred. Anyone interested in a copy of that document should contact Tom Adams at tcadams54@yahoo.com.

The next step in the process is to pick a new phone-friendly format among Wild Apricot templates and start the process of setting up a new web site by transferring and updating what we want to retain.

Membership Coordinator Bryan Stevinson reported that 11 new members had joined the club in the last 30 days, 11 were due for renewal, and 10 were overdue. Members receive an email prior to expiration of their membership, after their membership has expired, and when they are three-months past due. The preferred way to join the club or renew membership is by credit card through the club's website. At the time of the meeting, we had 324 active members.

Ride Calendar Report

The ride calendar is shy on Sunday rides...reach out to Ride Director Mabel to get your ride on the calendar. The process is EASY and you can submit all the ride details via the club website.

Social Media Report

The Sac Wheelmen Facebook Group is a private account all members are encouraged to join. A private account is only available to account members. No one else in the Facebook world sees what is posted there. What is posted there automatically goes into the "news" feed of Facebook members of the group. As such it's a nice way for members of the club to share videos and photos.

"But we can already share photos using our club email account," you say. True. However, Facebook is designed to share photos and videos. They can be captioned. You can comment on them. And they don't get buried in a long list of emails and eventually lost forever. You are not reliant on the "news" feed. You can go directly to the club account: https://www.facebook.com/groups/SacWheelmen. If you are interested in seeing Guerneville Zodiac photos, they have been gathered and posted on the club's Facebook Group account.

How do you become a member? First off, you need to establish a Facebook account. That means you have to provide a name and email account information. MAY IS NATIONAL BIKE MONTH – 2022 RESULTS! By Debbie Finley

Ever since 1956, cyclists have pledged every month of May to ride their bikes, set personal goals, and log their miles. Why? Because it's a time to celebrate everything about bicycling. The one mission of May is Bike Month is to get more people riding their bikes. And that means not only riding for fun and exercise, but to shop, go to work, to improve your health, to protect our environment and reduce your carbon footprint, decrease pollution and traffic, see the world at a slower pace, and so much more.

This was the 16th annual May is Bike Month in the Sacramento Region. It was hosted by Sacramento Area Bicycle Advocates (SABA). Over 3,100 riders in the Sacramento Region rode more than 550,000 miles and saved nearly 60,000 lbs CO2 from entering the atmosphere.

The Sacramento Wheelmen, as a club, have enthusiastically participated for many years and this year we had 81 riders register to be in our group. (Our first goal was to get 20% of our 324 members to sign up and we easily passed the 64.8 number of members needed.) Our aim was simple...to just get out and ride as much and often as we could, and if we could ride with our buddies then that was a bonus. Well drumroll, we cycled 37,029 miles as a group this May. (Goal 2 to top last year's mileage of 22,059 miles was easily achieved. And we were also successful in meeting goal 4 of logging in at least 60% of our all-time high mileage-59,669 milesin 2016.)

We had one goal that we almost (but not quite) met: Goal 3 was to have 100% of registered riders log miles in May. We had 77 out of 81 log in miles. Close but no bananas!

Our two main friendly local rivals were the Sacramento Bike Hikers and the Sierra Foothills Cycling Club (SFCC). We all had similar number of registered riders. While we surpassed the Bike Hikers, the SFCC eclipsed us by a mere 1,000 miles. Way to go SFCC!! (Note: numbers may change slightly as the MIBM staff is auditing rider mileage and results are not posted yet.)

Lastly, I know you are all anxious to get a rundown of our individual members and their amazing achievements:

- We had 9 members log miles commuting to work: Rod F, Dennis K, Caron M, Tom G, Bryan O, Leyne M, Karen H, Sarah F, and one member, Linda L, who actually commuted 329 miles to work in May.
- We had 5 members top 800 miles: Joni B, Mabel, Linda A, Gary W, and Leyne M.
- We had 4 top 900 miles: Paul G, Caron M, Carrie S, and Cliff M.
- And amazingly, we had 5 riders top 1000 miles: Ken B, Linda L, Bob S, Art O and Zia T. Incredible numbers!

So who was our actual Wheelmen animal? Off the starting block it was a battle between Ken B, Linda L, and AO. (Don't know what AO was thinking, but he neglected to pack his bike when he went to Indianapolis and watched Marcus Ericsson go in circles for 500 miles.) Then out of nowhere and riding so strong, Bob S solidly overtook AO, and Zia T came in right afterwards.

Final results:

- 1. Ken Bell 1,442 miles
- 2. Linda Lasswell 1.235 miles
- 3. Bob Storelli 1,090 miles
- 4. Art Oliver 1,051 miles
- 5. Zia Tabaie 1,015 miles.

Ken Bell has won the coffee gift card for fiercest animal for 2022 MIBM.

Zia Tabaie has won the gift card for the largest percentage increase in miles as compared to April.


